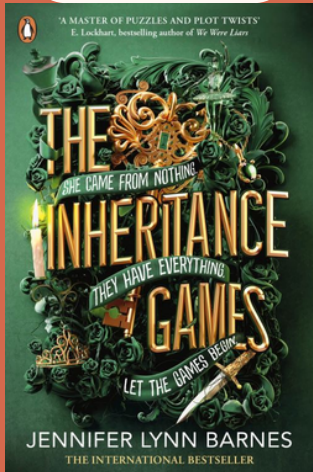


'We are Displaced' by Malala Yousafzai
