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What is Refugee Week?

19th-25th June 2023

Refugee Week is an annual festival that celebrates the contributions, creativity and resilience of people seeking sanctuary. It's been running in the UK since 1998 and is always the week of World Refugee Day (20 June).

This year is a big one as it's our 25th Anniversary. Our theme is compassion and we invite everyone to celebrate what compassion looks like in action.

Through a programme of arts & culture, sports and educational activities alongside exciting media and creative campaigns, Refugee Week brings people from different backgrounds to connect beyond labels, as well as foster a deeper understanding of why people are displaced, and the challenges people face when seeking sanctuary.

Who can take part?

It's an umbrella festival which means anyone can take part no matter where they are. Last year, an estimated 1.6 million people took part in Refugee Week, with over 1000 events all across the UK (including Scotland, Wales and Ireland) as well as 5 new international festivals (Berlin, Greece, Hong Kong, Malta, Taiwan), joining the long standing Refugee Week Australia.

Who is it for?

Refugee Week is for everyone. Anyone can get involved whether you have 5 minutes or 5 months to prepare something. In the past, we've had all sorts of individuals, groups and organisations take part such as: sports clubs, faith groups, schools, businesses, arts organisations, community groups and people at home. Activities have included performances, artistic commissions, creative workshops, school activities, community get togethers, football tournaments, faith events, cooking classes, meals, walks, talks and podcasts – just to name a few!

The last few years have been challenging for all of us. We are still adjusting to new realities post-lockdown as well as responding to new crises. In the UK, dangerous antimigration government rhetoric continues, along with inhumane conditions for asylum seekers.

But, none of these things happen in isolation. We know how interconnected our world is: how something seemingly "far away" impacts everyone. All of this makes us even more aware of the need to widen our circles of compassion.


The Simple Acts campaign is about



Send a Message:

Idea 1: In a group write a banner welcoming refugees & put it on display

Idea 2: Write a letter to a refugee who has recently arrived in the UK. What would you want to tell them to make them feel welcome?


Idea 3: Write a message to your imagined descendants or someone in the future. What are your hopes for the world they are living in? What might we do today to bring it about?

Idea 4: Write a short story. Everyone has a story of migration. Whether directly or indirectly. Whether that's from across land or across oceans. We invite you to wonder and then write, where does your story begin?

<u>Idea 5:</u> Write a letter as a class to your local MP or local newspaper telling them why and how people seeking safety should be treated with compassion.





Share a dish:

Idea: Make a cookbook with all your classmates using everyone's favourite recipes from home and your family.

Are there any similarities? Differences? How many different heritages are part of your cookbook?

Want to take it one step further?: Research the origins of each of the dishes and ingredients. Were you surprised by anything?



Idea: Spend some time thinking about what your platform is and what are your spheres of influence? (hint: think about this as an individual, as a class, as a school etc).

Then map these (this could be anything from: assemblies, notice boards, family dinners, social media etc.)

Then, brainstorm ideas for all the different platforms you have access to an imagine how you could celebrate Refugee Week and this year's theme of compassion on each one e.g. a themed assembly, newsletter, a fundraising event, a dance, a music event, community event or even decorate your class, school or local area with orange hearts.


Free Materials & Shop

There's so many fantastic resources about having better conversations about migration and displacement as well as ways to grow our compassion. Here are a few:

British Red Cross

For conversations around refugees and migration BRC have <u>a series of teaching resources</u>, as well as a facilitated workshop called 'Empathy plus migration'.

For the theme of 'Compassion', they have a series of wellbeing and kindness resources for both adults and youth, including new: <u>Self-kindness toolkits</u> or <u>Kindness packs</u>.

National Education Union

The National Education Union (NEU) has resources to support schools to <u>develop an anti-racist approach</u> and <u>welcome refugee children all year round.</u>

<u>Welcoming Refugee Children to Your School</u>: Information about ways in which you can create a refugee-friendly school, make an accessible curriculum and think about some principles of effective practice.

<u>Anti-racism charter</u>: A framework to help you explore ideas around race equality and plan how to tackle racism with children, young people and staff.

Schools of Sanctuary is a national network of over 300 primary and secondary schools committed to creating a culture of welcome and inclusion for refugees and people seeking asylum.

Kazzum Arts

Kazzum Arts uses creativity to enable children and young people who have been impacted by trauma and adversity to feel seen, heard and valued. They do this by providing opportunities to explore creative expression and agency through multidisciplinary arts activities. They have an excellent collection of resources including lesson plans, animations, facts and figures, posters and activities for Primary and Secondary level students. Find all their resources here!

Kazzum Arts

Key Terms and Myth Busting Quiz: Key information about refugees and asylum seekers, including key terms, facts, myth busters and a quiz!

Kazzum also has a series of animations called 'Grounded' which have been developed to support the mental health and wellbeing of children and young people. These animations are available in English, but have also been translated into Vietnamese, Arabic, French and Pashto to reflect the languages commonly found in the communities that they work in.

Brighter Futures

Brighter Futures supports young people facing immigration issues to have a voice. Membership is open to young migrants aged 18-30 and they meet weekly at Praxis to share their thoughts, get creative, plan campaigns and events, play games, have fun and eat delicious food together.

<u>Self Help Activities for Young Migrants</u>: Packs for three mental health and coping techniques for young migrants.

<u>Doors of Compassion: The Rescuers</u> <u>and the Story of the Kindertransport</u>

<u>This resource</u> invites students to connect with the theme of compassion and explore the concept of the Circle of Influence. The resource enables students to reflect on how our words and actions have an impact on others as well as ourselves. View the resource here. Using the <u>ukholocaustmap.org.uk</u> students will learn about the Rescuers and the story of the Kindertransport, individuals whose actions enabled hundreds of refugee children to travel to the UK during World War II.

Students will respond and be guided to create Doors of compassion. These doors are a symbol of welcome and sanctuary, and invite us to reflect on how we can build a culture of welcome, in our schools and the wider community, for refugees, asylum seekers and migrants. View resource here.

Ground Work

<u>Culture Club</u> is a primary education resource exploring the cultural heritage and traditions of refugees living in London. Made by teachers for teachers, this pack links to the national primary school curriculum, enabling pupils from ages 4-11 to discover the joys of various cultures through videos, storytelling, crafts and recipes from different backgrounds. Whether pupils are homelearning or in the classroom, Culture Clubs takes students on a journey of cultural experiences from the kitchen to the garden.

Further optional activities including natural dyeing, paper marbling, planting and growing, puppet making, instrument making, songs and games are available to download here.

The Visionaries

The Visionaries is a social enterprise established in 2018 to help create nurturing school communities and to support young people into healthy adulthood.

<u>Wellbeing Conversations</u>: Activities and approaches to creating safe, reflective spaces.

<u>Courageous Conversations training</u>: Unlock a healthier school culture by training school staff to facilitate dialogue around conflictual issues. This adaptable 1-day training supports school staff to host Courageous Conversations around sensitive cultural issues such as racial injustice, sex & sexual harassment, bullying, school culture, drugs and mental health into opportunities.



Twinkl Teaching Resources

Since the war started in Ukraine in February 2022, Twinkl Educational Publisher has provided support to Ukrainian children and their families by making lots of resources available in Ukrainian. Earlier in 2023, we also joined forces with the Ukraine-based charity fund Voices of Children to offer FREE mental health and art therapy resource packs to families who suffered as a result of the war operations, and anyone in need. These packs are easily accessible and all mental health and art therapy resources have been approved and recommended by the Foundation's psychologists. More information can be found on this blog.

All resources are available during Refugee Week, in both Ukrainian and English, to aid speakers of both languages in accessing them.

The Flying Seagull Project

The Flying Seagull Project is a children's arts and circus charity that has worked with young people seeking refuge for 15 years. In partnership with Seymour Park Community Primary School and their pupil steering group the Rights Rangers, we've prepared a collection of free Refugee Week learning resources and activities.


The resources are suitable for children from five to 11, and include advice sheets to help you have fun with these activities whatever environment you're learning in. The activities and information draw on our 15 years' experience working with young people of similar ages who've experienced forced displacement, and will encourage children to learn and think about the experiences of child refugees with empathy and compassion.
