Empathy and reading

Empathy is our ability to experience and understand someone else's feelings. It creates stronger, kinder communities. Young people won't thrive without this crucial life skill, and developing it improves their wellbeing, reading for pleasure and active citizenship.

Excitingly, research shows that empathy is a learnable skill, and that books play a key role in developing it. When young people identify with book characters, they learn to see things from other people's point of view. As they read, they are building their empathy skills.


How does empathy work?


Please use them to inspire young people to turn feelings of empathy into action – in their homes, schools and communities.


Poetry

A beautifully illustrated collection of poems telling individual stories of refugees escaping war and persecution. Poetry can expose stark truths and raw emotions and this collection is painful but uplifting, the resilience of the human spirit movingly highlighted by the final poem, 'Unbroken'.




Crossing the Line* Tia Fisher





Love permeates this beautiful novel. Sad circumstances lead to Maudie kidnapping her brother Jake from his carer. Hiding in perilous conditions, Maudie's understanding and empathy for her disabled brother grows and, even though they are separated from family and friends, the bonds deepen.

Wild Song Candy Gourlay



Top tips: empathy-building reading practices

- 1. Put empathy into action Could a book help inspire young people to take action to help others? Find rich social action resources to help you www.empathylab.uk/empathyaction-month
- **2. Talk about the characters** Instead of discussing what might happen next, focus on the characters and their feelings to build understanding of other people. Our emotion maps by top illustrators are a great resource **www.empathylab.uk/RfE-illustrators-gallery**
- **3. Read aloud** Sharing stories aloud at any age builds a sense of community, connection and shared experience.

- **4. Share diverse books** Include a wide range of books set in other countries and with characters of different races, religions and experiences. Inspire young people to imagine life for people in different situations from their own.
- **5. Listen 100%** Listening is a crucial part of empathy. Listen carefully as young people discuss their experience of a book.
- **6. Build human connections** Read titles from the collection yourself as a springboard for deep conversations which will help you understand and connect with young people in new ways.
